1. Summary

This is a funny poem about the friendship between two characters - a duck and a kangaroo. The duck is bored of living in his pond, and envies the kangaroo who can hop everywhere. He longs to explore the world outside the pond. He asks the kangaroo to give him a ride on his back. But the kangaroo is worried that the duck's wet and cold feet might give him rheumatism. The duck has thought about that already, and tells the kangaroo that he has bought socks and a cloak to keep warm. The Kangaroo then agrees to carry the duck on the end of his tail. The two of them hop merrily around the world three times.

The poem tells us that a friend who helps others, not only gives joy to others, but also enjoys happiness himself.

2. Stanza By Stanza Explanation

I Said the Duck to the Kangaroo, "Good gracious! how you hop! Over the fields and the water too, As if you never would stop! My life is a bore in this nasty pond, And I long to go out in the world beyond! I wish I could hop like you!" Said the Duck to the Kangaroo.



The Duck tells the Kangaroo that he admires his ability to hop everywhere. In contrast, the Duck states that he is bored in his "nasty pond" and "longs" to explore the world.

II

"Please give me a ride on your back!" Said the Duck to the Kangaroo.
"I would sit quite still, and say nothing but 'Quack', The whole of the long day through! And we'd go to the Dee, and the Jelly Bo Lee, Over the land, and over the sea; Please take me a ride! O do!" Said the Duck to the Kangaroo.

The Duck asks the Kangaroo to take him for a ride on his back so that he can see more of the world. He promises to sit quietly and say nothing but "Quack" all day.

Said the Kangaroo to the Duck, "This requires some little reflection; Perhaps on the whole it might bring me luck, And there seems but one objection, Which is, if you'll let me speak so bold, Your feet are unpleasantly wet and cold, And would probably give me the roo-Matiz!" said the Kangaroo.

The Kangaroo agrees to carry the Duck. He requests the Duck to balance himself carefully at the end of his tail. Then the Duck and the Kangaroo go hopping around the world three times. They are both very happy.

- 4. **Reflection** thinking On further **reflection**, I have decided to do my B.A. rather than to get a job.
- 5. **Unpleasantly** unkindly The teacher was sorry she spoke to me **unpleasantly**, she told me she was very tired.
- Roo-Matiz made up word for rheumatism, which is a disease that causes pain and stiffness in the joints.
 My grandmother has rheumatism and it is very hard for her to move around.
- Worsted high quality wool In the winter, I wear pants made from worsted wool.



- Cloak long, sleeveless clothing that hangs loosely from the shoulders; it is worn over other clothes My friend bought a worsted wool cloak for winter.
- 9. **Cigar** cigars are rolls of dried tobacco leaves which people smoke I hate the smell of **cigar** smoke because it is very strong.
- Pale light coloured
 She looked very pale after her surgery.
- 11. **Bound** to move quickly with large leaps; also to tie up The goat **bounded** up the mountain effortlessly.

2. Alliteration: The repetition of a consonant sound at the start of two or more closely placed words.

2.	how you hop -	'h' sound is repeated
3.	sit quite still, and say -	's' sound is repeated
4.	But to balance-	'b' sound is repeated
5.	dear duck -	'd' sound is repeated

- 6. whole world 'w' sound is repeated
- **3. Refrain**: The use of a musical rhyming sentence throughout the poem. "Said the duck to the kangaroo" has been repeated to lay stress on the request made by the duck to the kangaroo.
