1. Summary

- Dangerous something or someone that is harmful
 This is a dangerous area and you can be attacked at night.
- 2. **Kingdom** a place ruled by a king or queen The United **Kingdom** is ruled by Queen Elizabeth.



Disobeyed – not do what you are told to do
 Sunita disobeyed her teacher and continued talking in class.

4. **Project** – something that is planned with the idea of achieving a particular aim

The flyover **project** in Delhi was delayed.

Disciple – the follower of a teacher or leader
 Jesus Christ had twelve main disciples who helped to spread his teachings.

6. **Stirring** – moving

It was hot and still that day and no leaves on the trees were stirring.

7. **Strangers** – people you have never met before
Two **strangers** entered our house suddenly and demanded money from my father.

8. **Amazed** – very surprised

I was **amazed** when my teacher told me that I had stood first in my class.

- 9. **Wandered** walked slowly about a place without any purpose I **wandered** around the mall looking at the shops.
- Groceries food or other items that you can buy at a supermarket or at the local grocery store (kirana/ pansari)
 My mother stops to buy groceries for our dinner on her way back from office.
- Delighted very pleased

I was **delighted** to hear that we were going on a school trip to Agra.

12. **Wisdom** – the ability to make sensible decisions or judgments because of your knowledge or experience

I had the **wisdom** to stop arguing with my brother before he got too angry.

- Sacred relating to a religion or considered to be holy The Ganga is a sacred river for the Hindus.
- 14. **Merchant** someone whose job is buying and selling goods, usually in large amounts

The rich **merchant** fed the poor outside the temple every Saturday.



- 15. Sneaked to go somewhere very quietly so no one can hear or see you I was late getting to school, so I sneaked into my class, as I didn't want my teacher to see me.
- Loot stolen goods, especially during war
 Burglars disconnected the alarm and looted the store.
- Collapsed suddenly fall down
 The walls of the mud house collapsed during the earthquake.
- 18. Complained said that something is wrong or that you are annoyed about something
 I complained to the hotel manager about the dirty bathroom.
- Pursuing trying to achieve something or continuing to do something over some time
 My brother is pursuing a degree in law because he wants to join my father's law firm.
- 20. Ancient from a long time agoThis is an ancient temple, built five hundred years ago.
- 21. **Wrongdoer** a person who does something bad or illegal The **wrongdoer** was brought to the police station and handed over to the police.
- 22. **Compensate** to make up for something, give (someone) something, typically money, to make up for a loss, suffering, or injury Nothing can **compensate** for the death of my dog.
- 23. **Injustice** a situation where there is no fairness and justice My father was falsely accused of theft, so that was definitely an **injustice**.
- 24. **Summoned** ordered someone to come to a particular place
 The Prime Minister **summoned** an emergency meeting of all the ministers to discuss the pollution problem.
- 25. Burgle to break into a house or building to steal My uncle's house was burgled of all his cash the night he went out to attend a wedding.
- 26. **Accused** person who is charged with a crime
 The five men **accused** of car theft, asked the judge to give them one more week to prove their innocence.



27. **Pleads** – appeals, begs

The man accused of murder **pleaded** for forgiveness.

- 28. **Guilty** having done something wrong, broken a law The three boys were **guilty** of stealing their teacher's money.
- 29. **Helpless** unable to do anything to help yourself or anyone else I looked on **helplessly** as the mother continued beating her child.
- 30. **Execution** to kill someone as a legal punishment The murderer's **execution** was delayed due to an appeal in court.
- 31. **Jingling** tinkling

 The little bells hanging in the temple were **jingling** in the breeze.
- 32. **Complicated** difficult The math question was very **complicated** and I could not answer it.
- 33. Trembling shaking slightly because you are cold, frightened or emotional
 He was trembling with cold when he came back home after the walk.
- 34. Distracted unable to concentrate or give attention to something I was very distracted by the loud music outside my window so I could not concentrate on my homework.
- 35. Innocent not guiltyThe innocent man was freed by the judge.
- 36. **Scoundrel** someone who cheats and deceives others

 He was a thief and a **scoundrel**, but he was so pleasant that most people did not realize his true nature.
- 37. **Weighing the evidence** examining at all the facts
 The judge decided to free the accused person after **weighing the evidence**.
- 38. **Evidence** anything that helps to prove that something is or is not true There was enough **evidence** to prove that Rita had stolen the money.
- 39. **Bailiff** a law officer who makes sure that the court's orders are obeyed The **bailiff** was sent to our neighbor's house to evict him because he was staying there illegally.



- 40. **Accusation** a claim that someone has done something wrong or illegal There were many **accusations** of corruption against the minister, yet he did not resign.
- 41. **Impatient** not willing to wait

 My brother makes a lot of mistakes in his work because he is always so **impatient**.
- 42. **Original** the first, creative Sometimes it is hard to tell if a painting is **original** or a clever copy.
- 43. **Consult** to get information or advice from a person Many people **consult** an astrologer before deciding on a wedding date.
- 44. **Decisive** able to make decisions quickly and confidently My mother is very **decisive** about family matters.
- 45. **The root of** the cause, the reason for some event Widespread corruption was at **the root of** the revolt.
- 46. **Stake** a strong stick that is pushed into the ground to mark something The area where the execution was to take place was marked by **stakes**.
- 47. **Impaling** piercing with a sharp instrument **Impaling** murderers was a common punishment in the old days.
- 48. **Decree** an official order

 An official **decree** states that all children above five years of age must go to school.
- 49. **Vision** an idea or image of something
 The holy man had a **vision** that there would be an earthquake the next day.
- 50. **Scrape** a difficult situation caused by one's own unwise behaviour My brother often gets into **scrapes** in school because he is so naughty.
- 51. Whisper to speak very quietly, using the breath, but not the voice, so that only person close to you can hear Hafiz leaned over and whispered something in his wife's ear.
- Addressed spoke to
 The Principal addressed all the students at the school assembly.



- 53. **Clamour** a loud and confused noise, specially of people shouting The children in my class **clamoured** for a holiday the day after the exams were over.
- 54. **Puzzled** confused because you do not understand something I am still **puzzled** as to why my father got angry so suddenly.
- 55. **Behaviour** the way that someone acts or behaves

 The children were on their best **behaviour** when the Inspector visited the school.
- 56. Mystery something strange or not known that has not been explained or understood.It is still a mystery how stone temples and pyramids were built in ancient times.
- 57. **Solemn** serious and without any humour Everyone looked very **solemn** at the funeral.
- 58. **Earshot** the distance within which a sound can be heard I waited till my brother was out of **earshot**, and then complained to my mother about his bad behavior.
- 59. **Ascetic** a simple and strict life, usually because of religious belief The Swami lived a very **ascetic** life up in the mountains, away from all human contact.
- 60. Postponed delayed an event to a later date My trip to Mumbai got postponed because I fell ill the day before I was supposed to travel.
- 61. **Criminal** someone who breaks the law, commits a crime The men locked up in the city jail are dangerous **criminals**.
- 62. **Disguised** changed one's appearance in order to conceal one's identity The criminal **disguised** himself as a policeman and escaped from jail.
- 63. **Promptly** to make something happen quickly
 My friend **promptly** answered my parents' questions about our plans for our trip to Agra.
- 64. **Panicked** suddenly feeling great fear or desperation
 The crowd **panicked** and started running away when the police arrived.



- 65. **Confusion** a situation in which people do not understand what is happening, what they should do, who someone, or what something is There is some **confusion** about the exact date of the exam.
- 66. **Mourned** feel or express great sadness specially over someone's death The country **mourned** the death of their beloved Prime Minister.
- 67. **Discussed** talked or wrote about a subject in detail

 The entire family **discussed** what should be done when the landlord asked them to vacate the flat.
- 68. **Unnoticed** without being seen
 We managed to leave the party **unnoticed** and hurried back home.
- 69. Persuade to make someone do or believe something by advising or urging
 I persuaded my friend to come over and play badminton with me.
- 70. Condition an arrangement that must exist before something else can happen
 I will help you with your project on the condition that you will clean up your room.

- 3. Name all the people who are tried in the king's court and give reasons for their trial.

- 5. What are the guru's words of wisdom? When does the disciple remember them?
- 6. How does the guru manage to save his disciple's life?
