vales: valleys, land at a low level between mountains, often with a river running through it jocund: cheerful, lighthearted, or merry marge: a poetic term for margin or edge, often referring to the border of a lake or body of water couch: in the context of the poem, it refers to a bed of flowers or a place where something is laid to rest

host: in this context means a large number or a

crowd

fluttering: moving lightly and quickly

glee: great delight, happiness, or joy

dales: valleys

ten thousand I saw at a glance: the speaker uses hyperbole to emphasize a large number; it doesn't mean that there were actually ten thousand daffodils!

pensive: engaged in deep or serious thought

oft: poetic usage of the word "often"
