2. Summary

The Midnight Visitor is a story about many things – pre-conceived ideas, deceptive appearances, drama, intrigue and the importance of having presence of mind to outwit your opponent.

The story is told from the viewpoint of Fowler, a young and romantic writer. It revolves around the dramatic meeting between a secret agent, Ausable and his opponent, another secret agent, Max. Max is very jealous of Ausable and wants to outsmart him and get the important report on missiles that Ausable is expecting. Ausable gets rid of Max by using his presence of mind and fooling him into thinking that there is a balcony outside his window and that the person knocking on his door is from the Police. Max, to escape from the Police, steps out of the window and falls out of the building. There was actually no balcony outside the window and the person, who was knocking on the door, was the waiter who had brought some drinks that Ausable had ordered.

The story shows us how books, drama and films are massive influences on our life and how they create ideas and notions in our mind of what and how particular professions should look and behave like. We also quickly learn that appearances can be very deceptive and that we must spend some time to observe and analyse before we judge people. It is an exciting and fast paced story which has many elements of surprise and drama.
